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A Celebration of Easter – The Resurrection of Christ

The prophet Isaiah wrote in chapter 43 verses 18 – 19b "The Lord says, "Do not cling to events of the past or dwell on what happened long ago. ¹⁹ Watch for the new thing I am going to do. It is happening already—you can see it now!

The Israelites expected a messiah, but they thought he would be a soldier who would rescue them from the tyranny of Rome. Instead Jesus was tried before Pilot for treason because he claimed to be King. We know today that Jesus is the King of all Kings over all the earth, but Pilot did not. Rome believed that only the Emperor was King and for anyone else to claim that title was committing treason. So Jesus was beaten and nailed to a cross. But instead of just dying for the conviction of treason, he took the sins of everyone in the world upon himself and paid the price for evil.

Following his death, Jesus was buried in a tomb belonging to Joseph of Arimathea, who was a respected member of the Jewish Religious Council. It was Preparation Day, the day before the Sabbath. No work could be done on the Sabbath so they hurried to place Jesus in the tomb.

On Sunday, three days after his death, several women who were Jesus' followers went to the tomb with spices to anoint Jesus' body but they found that the stone covering the entrance to the tomb had been rolled away and Jesus' body was gone. Two of the women ran back to the other disciples to tell them what they had seen, but Mary Magdalene stayed at the tomb crying. Jesus met her there and explained that he had been raised from death to life. She worshipped him and then Jesus sent her to tell the other disciples the amazing Good News – Jesus is alive and our sins are forgiven!

What seemed like a tragedy - Jesus' death, turned out to be the greatest blessing the world has ever known – his resurrection from death to life breaking the power of sin and evil. God had planned this from the beginning of time in order to reconcile human beings to himself. As we celebrate Easter, we give thanks for this gift of New Life that Jesus gives us and acknowledge that God is a God of forgiveness, grace and love.

God still redeems and renews us today, often in ways we least expect. This time of transition between Installed Pastors is a wonderful time to celebrate God's ongoing transformation in our lives. Quaker Memorial Presbyterian Church is Christ's church and the Triune God is still at work empowering us to do God's mission and ministry. Yes, we are a different church than we were years ago, but we are still a vital, vibrant church in which God's Spirit continues to fill the whole congregation with Spiritual Gifts and Talents. Just as God had an amazing plan for reconciling the world, God has a plan for the future of Quaker Memorial Presbyterian Church. During this time of discernment, we give thanks for all that we have and are and we can look with hope to the future to which God is calling us.



Are You Happy?

Happiness. That elusive concept that everyone seems to be in search of. Is it found in exuberant moments or quietness? In companionship or solitude? From the inside flowing out or the outside flowing in? Is it in having or in giving or even needing? In finding or in losing? In results or in the work? How long does it have to last to qualify as happiness and not just a fleeting moment in time? There are numerous questions to compare but really, what does it mean to be happy? Is it important to be happy?

Researchers have found that if we celebrate the small victories, not just the big ones, we will be happy longer and more often. An article I read recently stated "The grass is always greener where you are not. If you are not happy within, only temporary elation awaits you when you make the change. Find peace and joy within and no matter the unsatisfactory situation, you will pull through. Do your best with what you can. When the time comes to make a change, you are not reliant on the change to make you happy, but to propel you forward in what you need to do. You are already ahead."

While there is truth to this, the obvious question staring us in the face from that quote is, where are you finding this peace and joy within? Dear Christian, are you able to answer these questions? Rather than willpower, grit and gumption from self, we rely on the Holy Spirit that Christ asked the Father to give us, John 14:15-17, as we learned in Week 3, Day 1 of our Discernment bible study we are currently doing. By God's grace we can start where we are; and even though it is not an easy path, if we allow Him to work, we will be amazed at the results. At that point, perhaps happiness.

Tell the agent you want to enroll your Kroger Plus card in the community rewards program. Specify that your rewards go to Quaker Memorial Presbyterian Church NPO # HH690.
- If you have signed up your Kroger Plus card online before, once logged into your Kroger account, search for **Quaker Memorial Presbyterian Church either by name or HH690** and then click Enroll.

Shoes by Mary Woerner

The children at the schools in Haiti wear uniforms. Part of the uniform is black shoes. There are all types of shoes worn by the kids - dress shoes, athletic shoes, boots, lace-ups and slip-ons. The final week before leaving for our trip to Haiti we were asked to bring 35 pounds of black shoes with us to deliver to the school children. It was a nuisance to have to eliminate 35 pounds of luggage at the last minute, but it was well worth the trouble!

I was fortunate to be able to help give the children at Repatriate school new shoes. We first organized the shoes into groups of girls' shoes, boys' shoes and unisex shoes.

Five elementary school girls, probably about 4th graders, came into the room. They immediately began pointing and whispering among themselves and although I couldn't understand what they were saying it was obvious they were excitedly picking out which shoes they hoped to receive. It was crushing when three of the girls were sent away without new shoes because we didn't have their size. The two girls that did get shoes were all smiles and giggles.

Soon more children showed up to replace their old shoes with new ones. Each student was given a pair of shoes to try on. Nadege, the school principal, was quite good at looking one's feet and matching the correct sized pair of shoes. There was not a single complaint about the style or look of the new pair of shoes. There was a true appreciation and joy emitted from everyone. There was not a single pout or raising of the upper lip!





The recipients of the new shoes were selected based on the condition of the shoes they currently were wearing. If their feet were showing through the soles of the shoes, the seams were split open or their toes were sneaking out the front they were eligible to try on a new pair of shoes. These shoes were actually bought "gently used" in the United States, but compared to what they were wearing they were perfect!

After most of the shoes were given out and I witnessed many grins, smiles, laughs and hugs it was apparent that the last pair given to a young boy was a bit too small. In addition, the shoes were actually a pair of girls' boots, but when asked if he wanted to wait until we could bring additional shoes he said he would rather have this pair than the ones he had. He claimed that anything was better than what he had. The old shoes had no soles left. He may as well have been walking in bare feet. His seams were split at the toes and the shoes were so worn they looked more brown than black. As he left the room I couldn't see his face, but I could see his cheeks were puffed out as though he

had the biggest smile on his face. I wished at that moment that I had been wearing a pair of black shoes in his size so I could give them to him! He was beautiful and touched my heart immensely. Before the kids could go back to their classrooms they had to give up the old pair of shoes. If they were to keep the old pair, they may have attempted to sell the old pair on the street for a little bit of money. As you can see in the picture, the old shoes were no longer fit to be worn by anyone. My hope is that we can take many more shoes to the children when we go back next year!

Because I also witnessed the disrepair and overstretched socks that the kids were wearing, I would like to take white girls' socks with lace and tan boys' sock for each and every child in the elementary school - approximately 1,800 pair! **Challenge on!**


Dear Folks,
