An Unfinished Story: Mark's Odd Easter Narrative (adapted from the Presbyterian Outlook, Roger Gench)

Mark's story opens with three women who make their way to the tomb on that first Easter Sunday. When they arrive at the tomb, they find that the large stone that had sealed it had been rolled back and they meet a young man dressed in a white robe who bears astonishing news: "Do not be alarmed; you are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has been raised; he is not here. Look, there is the place they laid him. But go, tell his disciples and Peter that he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him, just as he told you."

And how do they respond to this announcement? Mark tells us: "They went out and fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had seized them; and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid." Period. The end! Wait a minute, what about the rest of the story? Scholars have debated this conundrum for centuries. But maybe Mark ended the story without an ending on purpose. Because an unfinished story will not let us go. It works powerfully upon us, drawing us in to ponder what happened next, and perhaps even to be a part of what unfolds — to finish the story.

That's why we are here as a body of believers. To share the amazing miracle of Christ's resurrection and what that means in our lives today and for all eternity. That is why we gather every Sunday (not just on Easter) to remind ourselves and the world that death is not the end, there is more.

So in this world filled with mass shootings, anger and prejudice, violent storms, wars and terrorism, and a pandemic that continues to plague us, we have good news to share and a word of hope for the world. The hate and fear and violence of our world does not have the last word. The good news of resurrection empowers us, by the same Spirit that raised Jesus from the dead, to live into the story as it continues to unfold — to finish the story in our everyday lives!

In 2020 the C&N committee was blessed with a very active and engaged membership. In addition to our 18 C&N members, we also had a group of "Friends of C&N" who offered their support with certain tasks as needed, (i.e. to help with cards, funeral receptions, prayer shawls).

At our last C&N meeting, held on March 8, 2020, the following changes were noted:

- Maureen Lockridge stepped down as co-chair of C&N, but remains an active member
- Sharon Barringer became Chairperson of C&N
- Sally Sease became C&N Session Liaison
- Sally Glannon stepped down from the committee and we thanked her for her many years of caring, dedication, and service
- Welcomed new members: Peggy Sullivan and Mary Woodie

We discussed implementing a schedule to ensure that all shut ins would receive a visit at least once a quarter, and if they wanted to receive communion we would make arrangements for that to happen. We anticipated doing this in conjunction with the Director of Congregational Ministries once that position was filled.

When COVID-19 restrictions were implemented in Virginia in March 2020, C&N members were no longer able to make any in-person visits to homes, hospitals, or care facilities. We were also unable to host funeral receptions. Due to uncertainty about how the virus could be spread early on, we were not able to bring food to individual homes for a time. Sadly, Quaker lost 22 beloved members from January 2020 - December 2020.

Since the committee was unable to have face-to-face interaction with our members, we tried to stay in touch and show our support by calling, sending cards, notes, emails, texts, and Facebook messages. C&N members also provided lots of extra prayers for people in urgent situations or if prayers were requested between the posting of the church-wide prayer list each Wednesday.

Card Ministry

The one area that did not slow down due to COVID-19 was our Card Ministry. In addition to the many cards that were sent out by Joyce Steele (sympathy, get-well, birthdays), we continued our tradition of sending cards to our shut ins for Valentine's Day, Easter, Thanksgiving, and Christmas. Individual C&N members also sent various cards and notes each week as they felt led.

Prayer Shawl Ministry

This group has not been able to meet, but have been in phone contact periodically. Diane Baldwin has been working on scarves for our 3 high school graduates..

Quaker Quill Mailing

Evelyn Glass mailed out copies of the Quaker Quill each month to 34 QMPC members who were shut in or didn't have Internet access.

CARE AND NURTURE GOALS FOR 2021

- Continue to stay in contact and serve QMPC members the best we can under COVID-19 regulations and guidelines. Continue to support the Card Ministry, Prayer Shawl Ministry, and Quaker Quill mailings. Also, continue prayers for our members and friends in need.
- When COVID-19 restrictions ease and the church is fully open again, we plan to resume funeral receptions and in-person visits. We hope to work with a DCM (once the position is filled) to develop and implement a schedule for visiting QMPC members who are home-bound, live in care facilities, or who are in the hospital once visitors are allowed in these facilities. This would include bringing communion to those who request it.
- Care & Nurture is committed to working closely with the pastor and session to reopen and resume church activity at QMPC when it is safe to do so.

QMPC Missions Committee 2020 Report

Even though there have been so many restrictions put on us during this time of COVID, the Missions Committee would like to remind you, the QMPC family, of all that you accomplished in 2020. It is a true testament of the caring nature of our congregation.



QMPC Mission Support for 2020 was as follows:

- **Food for Thought-** During the 2020 November **Food for Thought Snack Drive** the QMPC Congregation donated the following:

171 pkgs Goldfish	28 Trail Mix pouches
3 pkgs Ritz Bits,	22 pkgs Welch's Fruit Snacks

- The Mission Committee applied for and received a grant (\$1000) from Presbytery of the Peaks for Food for Thought which was used to purchase heavy bags to hold the food that the children took home.

- **2020 Habitat for Humanity Apostles' Build**

The QMPC Mission Committee applied for a Presbytery grant of \$1,000 which was given to the **2020 Apostles' Build**. QMPC donated an additional \$4,600 for that Apostles' Build. From this \$4,600 donated, \$2,600 came from Covenant Presbyterian Church as a donation when the church closed.

Ladies from QMPC provided 25 to 30 lunches for three work days during that build. Eight different workers from QMPC provided manual labor for the build.

- **Meals on Wheels**

QMPC members continued their support of **Meals on Wheels** in 2020. Along with a \$2,900 budget line item, three different delivery routes are driven by members of QMPC weekly, and members volunteer at the Meals on Wheel office once per week.

- **QMPC's Garden**

The garden continues to be very successful, and our prayer is that this year will be no different. Below is a tally of food given to Miriam's House, the Salvation Army, the Blue Ridge Food Bank, and Daily Bread for 2020 and previous years:

House of Hope Haiti Mission

The QMPC mission team was unable to go to Haiti in 2020. However, like so many other things, a lot did get completed remotely! The remote work was made possible by the many relationships the team has made during previous trips and the generous donations given by numerous people.



One of the projects you have supported is Solar Power for the **House of Hope**. During 2020 we were able to buy and mount an additional 9 solar panels on the roof which will double the power being generated. The contractor helping us in Haiti - working remotely, will hopefully have them in operation soon. In addition to COVID-19, the Haitians are still struggling with political unrest. The contractor has experienced delays at times when it is not safe for him to move around Port-au-Prince to get parts and visit the House of Hope.

In addition, we have purchased panels and frames to install another 18 panels in 2021. Also, we were able to use the contractor to make a repair to the system when problems occurred earlier in the year.

You collected nearly \$600 worth of black shoes which were sent to the children at the **Haiti Outreach Mission** (HOM) schools in Haiti.

We provided an incubator and egg turner for the House of Hope chicken coop that the team upgraded in 2019. The chickens continue to be an important source of protein for the girls during the difficult times they face.

We were also able to help the House of Hope pay for a new water pump for their well.

We continue our church's sponsorships for the two students - Naika and Herlyn.

QMPC Mission Committee plans for 2021

At the present time we are discussing what our future post-pandemic will look like, and where our congregation can do the most good. We are also considering different grants that would be helpful in our endeavors to help wherever that help is needed. We do know the following projects are currently in the works.

- **Rise Against Hunger**
In 2021 the QMPC Congregation will be packing 10,000 meals after Worship Service on October 3, 2021. We have applied for a Presbytery of the Peaks 2-cents-a-meal grant to support the cost of this project. We also have a line item for \$1,500 in the 2021 Budget.
- **QMPC Garden 2021**
We are changing our planting schedule to be more productive. Church member, Lewis Garbee delivered a dump truck load of sawdust and manure for spreading on the garden and composting in the compost bins. We will ask the city to bring leaves to us next fall for composting. Our plan is to involve more people in the garden.
- **Food for Thought 2021**
In April we will be doing a hygiene supply drive, and in November we will do another Snack Food drive. The Committee has added a line item of \$500 to help support this mission.
- **Haiti Mission 2021**
We will collect school shoes again to ship to the school in Haiti. Our plan is to install the 18 solar panels and 9 frames on the ground now at the House of Hope to make them independent of the electrical grid in Port-au-Prince. Most likely the local contractor will do that task.
We will be reaching out to QMPC and Randolph congregations to sponsor more children to go to the Haiti Outreach Mission Schools. Presently in the two congregations, members independently sponsor 16 students. Help is needed!
We will be sending three chicken runs to the House of Hope. These runs are 9 feet by 18 feet. The chickens, ducks and turkeys are eating their garden running free in the compound and they need the eggs, meat and vegetables to feed the students.
- **QMPC Missions budget support for 2021**
The session has adopted the same financial support to the different missions in our budget for 2021 that we supported in 2020.
- **Matthew 25 Church**
PCUSA has initiated a new program called "Being a Matthew 25 Church" - our Committee will be exploring what this means and will be reporting to the congregation at a future date.

We know that our congregation has been involved in many ways in our community, and we do not know them all, but we appreciate all you do. You can be proud of what you accomplish in our community and our world. We pray that we can continue to rely on your help as we move forward.



Budget & Finance Committee 2020 Report

I feel the need to write a thank you note to the congregation vs. giving an update of budget and finance I will attempt to do both. We do owe a deep gratitude to the congregation during 2020. We completed a capital campaign and exceeded the goal we set. We had giving greater than our needs during a time of financial uncertainty for a lot of the families that make up our congregation resulting in a carry-over of over 47k. This means we did not have to use any of the budgeted money from endowment which helps us in the future. We were able to repair our roof out of the operating budget. This was done during a year where average church attendance was about 30.
