QUAKER MEMORIAL PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH MISSION STUDY PLAN - 2019

Having completed six(6) months of discernment (which included: a six (6) week Bible Study, intensive discussions with the congregation, the gathering of hard statistical data, surveys of young adults and seniors, and assessing the maintenance needs of the building and potential use of the facility), the Session met on July 19 and 20, 2019 to discuss the future of the church. One outcome of their discussion was a reaffirmation of the current Mission Statement which was approved by the Session on February 4, 2011 and reaffirmed on July 20, 2019.

MISSION STATEMENT

"WELCOMING ALL, SERVING CHRIST, TRANSFORMING LIVES"

What followed the affirmation of the mission statement was an intense discussion of who and how QMPC was to be welcoming, the age group we are called serve, what service to Christ looked like for the church and how we as a congregation could be more open to God's transforming power. After debate and discussion which was respectful, faith-filled, creative and hopeful, the session identified the following priorities:

• An Intergenerational Focus

Recognizing that we currently serve both young and older adults, the session determined that it was not a question of "either or", but rather "both and". In light of this they agreed that many mission, ministry, service activities and programs could and should be intergenerational in their focus. This is not to say that there would not be specific programs and ministries for particular age groups and even genders (Youth Groups, Women's or Men's Groups). But when possible the session committed to a desire to realize our mission statement by integrating and serving all age groups, both without and within the church. Examples of these include the following:

- Increase partnership between different age groups
- Create new programs that leverage intergenerational synergy (e.g., hand's on mission projects for the local community, tutoring students, Bible-study with dinner and child-care provided, seniors training youth how to garden, youth and adults performing repairs on older member's homes)
- Foster a congregational mind-set that, by including all people in church activities, helps to achieve QMPC's mission statement
- Provide opportunities to work on projects that leverage the benefits of intergenerational fellowship

Increase Member Participation

Like many congregations, approximately 20% of the members do 80% of the work. The session desires to increase member participation in QMPC programs to enhance member investment in the church's ministries and to better share the work-load among more members. Realizing that some members are now homebound or reduced in their ability to be active as they once were, the session desires to find creative ways to involve these folks through card ministries, phone ministries, prayer ministry, etc. Examples of ways to increase greater involvement include the following:

- Challenge church members and friends to volunteer
- ♦ Purposefully ask members to volunteer
- ♦ Re-engage inactive or homebound members
- ♦ Nurture new members
- Create or align programs to benefit participants (i.e., through intergenerational synergy, skill-sharing, fellow-ship)

• Improve Communication

While information is shared through the weekly bulletin and announcements in worship, the welcome center in the Narthex, weekly e-mails to members and friends and a monthly newsletter, some members do not feel they are aware of all that is happening in the church. Another concern is that committees and task force groups tend to work independently and do not collaborate as well as they could on ministry, mission and other program efforts. In an effort to improve coordination and communication between groups and to increase effectiveness of communication with the congregation, the following are ways to address these concerns:

- Promote active assistance to staff, fostering the mindset that we don't help staff, but rather they enable members
- Provide new, more modern communication mediums (i.e., youtube, texting, snapchat, facebook)
- Convert static sign out front to an electronic sign to better communicate with the neighborhood
- ♦ Follow-up more effectively with visitors and new members

• Repair and Use of Church Facilities

Position QMPC to effectively use its facilities to do God's work and Bless God's Home

- Complete the capital campaign
- ♦ Conduct major repairs to enable safe and cost effective use of the facilities
- Determine new ways to take advantage of currently underused space
- ♦ Execute our new vision for QMPC

• Capital Campaign

The Property Task Force and the Session have identified significant maintenance projects that need to be addressed as soon as possible to reduce ongoing damage to the facility, to enhance security and to create a sense of welcome and invitation to members and community alike. The Capital Campaign will have its kick off on Sunday, September 15 following worship when members can talk with property specialists regarding the work that is needed and the cost involved.



Highlights from the July Meeting:

- Personnel Committee reported that the Director of Congregational Ministries position is filled. Pam Claterbaugh was hired and will begin August 12.
- Session set a goal to have the Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) in place by the end of September 2019.
- Personnel Committee is working on a job description for the new pastor.
- Motion was made and approved that session will be the PNC Nominating Committee.
 Each session member will bring 2 names of people they feel should be on the PNC to the August meeting.
- Criteria for PNC was decided. The PNC will include 7 members: 2 from Session, 2 in the 15-35 year old range, 2 in the 32-60 year old range, 2 >60, a mix of male/female members, long & short term members, possess spiritual, writing & interviewing skills, and belief in the Mission & Fellowship of QMPC.
- Capital Campaign will kick off on September 15, 2019. Property Task Force is gathering the cost of each of the projects.
- Cemetery Committee reported. No room in the cemetery, but there are still
 Columbarium niches available. Work to be done includes general tree work, repairs to
 the cemetery walls and install a directional sign for John Lynch's grave. Request for
 money for the Cemetery fund to complete the work was approved.




New Sunday School classes will be offered this year and all children and youth activities will begin back for the school year.

Let's help stock our Haiti elementary kids with shoes & socks! They need dress shoes for kids in K through 6th grade, sizes 5-12.




Kroger Community Rewards
