Imagine that you're walking along the beach on a gorgeous sunny day when something shimmery in the wet sand catches your eye. At first you think it might be a rock, still glistening from the tide that washed it in. But as you get closer, you see that it is really more of a gem. Not a gem in the precious stone sense, but in that "Wow", I just found something really special!" way. It's sea glass—the smooth frosty product of broken glass left to tumble in the waves.

I love sea glass. I love its beauty; I love the mystery of what it was. I love the journey of its becoming what it is, and I love what it symbolizes.

Sea glass is a broken piece of glass that has been washed up on the shore. But it's not just any piece of broken glass. It takes at least thirty to forty years of tossing and tumbling in the ocean to turn a regular piece of glass into a piece of sea glass. Sea glass, from its years of scraping against sand and rocks, is frosty and smooth. Jewel-like, sea glass is beautiful.

Each little piece of sea glass has a story. What was it before? A vase? A bottle? A jar once filled with something? Who owned it? How old is it? How did it end up in the ocean? Often, sea glass experts can come close to identifying what it used to be by its color or markings. But no one will ever know its complete story. I love the mystery of the story behind each little piece of sea glass.

And I love that each piece of sea glass has been on a journey. People have tried to create sea glass by using rock tumblers, but sea glass experts can tell the difference. The thirty-plus year process of tossing and tumbling in the ocean cannot be reproduced. There are no shortcuts. It takes years and time. It is the long journey-the tossing and turning, scraping and tumbling-that turns a regular piece of glass into a beautiful piece of sea glass.

Sea glass is well regarded as a symbol of renewal and healing, a metaphor for life. Cindy Kuhn writes that sea glass is "a symbol of our inner work and the process by which we are transformed."

We can be broken just like the sea glass is broken but through transformation we can be made whole. God can take us broken, and create us into something new. We are a new creation. From vase to sea glass. We can be exactly who He wants us to be.

And in the process of accepting the person that we are now, we can still value what we were. We no longer want our past to define us. God does that. But he can use our past to masterfully shape us and grow us. Kind of like sea glass. Our original state does not define us, but does play a part in what we are today. And that history-that story of a piece of sea glass- is part of what makes sea glass so intriguing. Each piece of sea glass has a story. Just like us, all of us.

And just as each story is special - each person -is special too.

So if you are being "tumbled" right now, know that something beautiful is coming!

Highlights from the December Session:

- Reuben Womack has been elected to the Committee on Ministry for the Presbytery of the Peaks.
- Diane Baldwin has been elected as chair of the Committee on Representation for the Presbytery of the Peaks
- Capital Campaign Update: 81 pledges \$173,255-Monies received \$206,045-Monies pledged
- Missions: The situation in Haiti is improving. The next Mission trip is tentatively scheduled for sometime between April and June. Our goal is to install 27 solar panels in all. This will give House of Hope total power independence. Nine panels are installed, currently. Nadage will be here January 8-12, 2020. Missions received \$2,500 for the Haiti trip from the Two Cents a Meal Grant.
- Stewardship/Finance: 83 pledges to date-\$218,840.00 pledged. At this time last year, we had 112 pledges in with \$280,080.00 pledged
- PNC: 25 PIF's have come in. The Committee is taking December off so as to come back refreshed and ready to go in January & February.

The prayer group in support of the PNC will meet once a month on the 4th Wednesday of the month starting at 6:45pm. The first meeting will be on January 22nd. In January, the PNC's work will intensify and they need all the support they can get. - Update participant congregations, including project promotion, and communication.
- June: Dedication ceremony with ribbon-cutting and celebration of success

Visit <u>http://www.kroger.com</u>, under **Savings & Rewards**, select **Kroger Community Rewards**

• If you have NOT signed up your Kroger Plus card online before, you will need to create an account which requires some basic information, a valid email address and your Kroger Plus card. Give it a 24 - 48 hrs and then try to enroll.

• You can also call Kroger customer service. Make sure you have your Kroger Plus card handy because they will need the number on the back of the card. 1-800-KROGERS (1-800-576-4377) and select option 3. Tell the agent you want to enroll your Kroger Plus card in the community rewards program. Specify that your rewards go to Quaker Memorial Presbyterian Church NPO # HH690.

• If you have signed up your Kroger Plus card online before, once logged into your Kroger account, search for **Quaker Memorial Presbyterian Church either by name or HH690** and then click Enroll.

If you do not have a Kroger Plus card, please go to the customer service desk at any Kroger and they will help you get one.
