## DISCERNING GOD'S CALL

Every believer and congregation is called to the Great Commission of "Go, and make Disciples" (Matt. 28:19) and the Great Commandment to "Love God, neighbor and self." (Matt. 22:36-40). Because we are called to fill these commands in unique ways, our role is to listen to *God's specific call* through prayer, Bible study, silence and discussion.

Discernment is a gift of the Holy Spirit that orients us to be attentive to the presence of God in our midst. While business practices and principles are used to identify the future in terms of a purpose and goals, this work is first and foremost a spiritual endeavor. It involves prayer, a humble surrendering of personal agendas and control, reflection on God's Word and careful listening to God's voice.

Through Spiritual Discernment, we seek

- to recognize what God is already doing
- to see situations and opportunities from God's perspective
- to listen for what God desires for the present and the future
- to follow the leading of the Holy Spirit to hear and obey

When our deepest desires are aligned with the deepest desires of God's heart, then individuals and congregations are fulfilling the purpose for which God created them and God is glorified and praised.

The Bible Study and small group discussions we will be doing have been prepared to assist you in listening for and to God's voice. You will be asked to read the scripture, prayerfully reflect on what it says allowing God's voice to speak into the silence, then answer the questions as you are led by the Spirit. At the end of each week you will join with others in a small group to discuss your insights, and learnings.

It is timely that we will be doing this discernment process during Lent as Lent is a time for prayer, Bible Study and reflection. Let me thank you in advance for your faithful participation and involvement in this process. It helps set the framework for discerning the qualities, characteristics and gifts needed in the next Installed Pastor for QMPC.

## **A Story About Discernment**

God speaks, touches, and reveals in God's own way and in God's own time.

Let me share with you a story about some fish who lived in a very small puddle of water. Listen to their conversation.

"Give me that waterbug." "No, I saw him first" "Get your fins off my supper." And so every day the little fish spent their time competing for waterbugs. Their stagnant puddle was cradled between the roots of an ancient oak tree, just beside a flowing river.

But one morning, there was a sudden Splash! An amazing brightly colored fish had jumped into the riverside puddle---a fish with golden scales. And---what was most unusual in this particular puddle---he was smiling!

One of the puddle-fishes asked, "Where do you come from?"The Sparkling Fish smiled brightly, "I come the SEA!" "The sea, what is the sea?" The sparkling Fish was surprised. "No one has ever told you about the sea? Why the sea---the sea is what fish are made for. It isn't like this little puddle; it's endless. A fish needn't swim in circles all day---he can dance with the tides! And it's sparkling clear! The sea is what fish are made for!"

Then a pale gray puddle-fish spoke up: "But how do we get to the sea?"

The Sparkling Fish answered: "It's a simple matter. You jump from this little puddle into that river and trust that the current will take you to the sea"

Astonishment clouded the puddle-water. At long last a brave little fish swam forward with a hard, experienced look in his eye.

He was a Realist Fish. He said: "It's pleasant talk about this "sea business;" but—if you ask me-we have to face reality. And what is reality? Obviously, it's day-to-day life swimming in circles and hunting for water bugs. Life is hard. It takes a Realist Fish to face facts."

The Sparkling Fish smiled, "but you don't understand---l've been there. I've seen the sea. It's far more wonderful than you can ... " But before he could finish, the Realist Fish swam away.

Next, a fish came up with a nervous twitch in his tail. He was a Scared Fish. He stammered, "You mean, we're suppose to j-jump into that big, swift river over there?" "Yes. For a fish who wants to go to the sea, the way lies through that river."

The Scared Fish's voice trembled in terror ... "Look, I'm just an ordinary fish! That river is deep and strong and wide, and I don't know where it goes. Why I might be swept away by the current. If I jumped out of my puddle, I wouldn't have any control over my life. NO! It's too risky for me!"

The Sparkling Fish whispered, "Just trust Me. Trust that the river will take you some place GOOD." But before he could finish, the Scared Fish hurried away. Finally there swam out a very dignified figure in a black robe. He was a Theologian Fish. Calmly he adjusted his spectacles saying: "My brother and sister fishes, our distinguished visitor has expressed many views which merit our consideration.

However, these puddle-fishes have expressed OTHER views. By all means, let us be reasonable. We can work this out. Why not form a (committee) discussion group? We could meet every Tuesday at 7 o'clock, and I's sure some of the lady fishes would be happy to bring some refreshments."

The eyes of the Sparkling Fish grew sad ... "No, this will never do," he said.

You JUMP. You jump out of this puddle and trust that the river will take you to the sea. Who will come and follow me? At first no one moved. But then a few puddle-fishes swam to his side. Together they jumped into the river and the current swept them away to the sea. The remaining puddle-fishes began to swim in circles and hunt for waterbugs just like they always had.

When we are seeking discernment, it is not just decision making, we are seeking God's will in our life.

### Trust.

We have to be willing to trust God and each other. Trust that God is present to us, speaks to us, is loving and merciful, and has work for us to do. Trust that opening our heart to others, we will encounter the Lord.

### Listening.

We must listen with open hearts and open minds, especially to what we do not want to hear. If discernment is to take place, we must let go of our preconceptions and expectations. We must be willing to hear the appealing and the unappealing, the familiar and the unfamiliar. If we become selective, we may turn a deaf ear to God. We must listen in silence, for stillness and silence enable us to hear.

### Prayer.

Through prayer we seek for ourselves total attentiveness to the all embracing presence of Christ. As we move from self-will to God's will, we place our lives in the hands of God. And then, we find that God has work for us to do.

## **Two Cents-a-Meal**

### A little history...

Originated with Presbyterian women to provide opportunity for individuals and families to participate in corporate response to world hunger. In November 1975, Florida resident Rosellyn Calvert, whose own family was struggling financially, asked God what she could do to help those suffering from hunger and poverty around the world. She was led to give just two cents a meal. The Calvert family committed to each give two cents, and in 1976 Rosellyn shared the concept with her presbytery.

### How is the money used?...

**45%** of the offering is awarded through grants **locally**, **45%** is awarded **regionally**, **nationally and to international organizations and agencies**. All grant recipients must address hunger through one or more of the following five Presbyterian Hunger Program areas of emphasis: direct food relief, development assistance, public policy advocacy, hunger education and/or lifestyle integrity. 10% is for administration.

## Here at QMPC...

An example. We were blessed to receive a grant to help start the church garden. Our stewardship of this investment has been blessed mightily by God and it has grown and multiplied over and over, far surpassing the original amount given. We give thanks to God for his continued hand in this work. Your 2 cts is providing fresh food through the Food Bank.

### What can YOU do?...

On the 1st Sunday every month, QMPC collects a offering in the red bowl located in the narthex. You can also give on the collection plate on any Sunday, only please indicate that it is specifically for Two Cents-a-Meal. If you do the math *(if math hurts your head, I have done it for you) it is a very minimal amount per individual.*
